

Here are a few California SIR Guidelines:

- California will be more cautious opening than most states.
- The opening will differ from county to county and perhaps city to city as requirements are lifted.
- With an assumed Sir-wide median age of 78, approximately 40 percent of our members are 80 years old or greater they could potentially be classified as "vulnerable".
- The bulk of our members will take a cautious, wait and see approach to engaging once restrictions are lifted.
- Numerous venues and caterers that Sir Branches used in the past will open slowly, if at all.
- Because of the likelihood of patchwork, county by county and in some cases city by city lifting of restrictions, and the sheer number of Sir Branches, a centralized reopening planning and approval process is not feasible. **Continued on page 4**.

Coronavirus Vaccine Development

In March, Dr. Anthony Fauchi suggested a **possible** 12-18 month timeline for having a vaccine. Much skepticism of 18 months for vaccine development was immediately expressed by other scientists. That prompted the pursuit of some research on the issue which is summarized below.

Vaccine Development Process and <u>Historical</u> Timelines

1. Discovery Stage: Before a potential treatment reaches a clinical trial, scientists identify antigens in laboratory work and do animal studies. This step traditionally has taken from three to six years. **Please note some examples given below for the timing for several <u>current</u> vaccine projects.**

2. Phase 1 Trials: This first attempt to assess the candidate vaccine in humans involves a small group of adults, usually between 20-80 subjects. The goals of Phase I testing are to assess the safety of the candidate vaccine and to determine the type and extent of immune response that the vaccine provokes. These trials typically only last <u>several months</u>.

3. Phase 2 Trials: A larger group of several hundred individuals participate in Phase 2 testing. Some of the individuals may belong to groups at risk of acquiring the disease. The goals of Phase 2 testing are to study the vaccine's safety, immunogenicity, doses, schedule of immunizations, and method of delivery. This phase typically lasts **several months to two years**.

4. Phase 3 Trials: Successful Phase 2 candidate vaccines move on to larger trials, involving thousands to tens of thousands of people. One Phase 3 goal is to assess vaccine safety in a large group of people. Certain rare side effects might not surface in the smaller groups of subjects tested in earlier phases. Phase 3 trials could_last from <u>one to three years</u>.

In normal circumstances, development of new vaccines and treatments would indeed take years. But the pharmaceutical industry is racing to compress this timeline using new technologies, and existing data with the support of nonprofit organizations, government agencies and regulatory authorities for this coronavirus.

Current Projects and Timelines

Moderna: This biotech company using new technology based on genetic information for the novel coronavirus produced the first clinical batch which underwent analytical testing and was shipped for clinical testing in a "record" **42 days** from initial creation. They began Phase 1 clinical testing on March 15.

Jenner Institute: Most other teams have had to start with small Phase I clinical trial participants to demonstrate safety. But scientists at the Oxford University's Jenner Institute had a head start on a vaccine, having proved in previous trials that similar inoculations were harmless to humans. That has enabled them to leap ahead and tests of their new coronavirus vaccine involving more than 6,000 people are <u>scheduled</u> for the end of May. A vaccine could **possibly** be available by September.

SinoVac: A Chinese company that recently started a Phase 1 clinical trial with 144 participants has also said that its vaccine was effective in rhesus monkeys.

Inovio Pharmaceuticals: Another vaccine, developed using new genetic based technology has already been injected into the first adult volunteers in Phase 1 trials.

As of April 23, the World Health Organization indicated there were 70-80 additional coronavirus vaccine development processes underway. It should be clearly pointed out that despite the accelerated accomplishments, none of these vaccines are guaranteed to be effective in humans. Also, there is concern that rapid testing may be risky and ultimately lead to previously undetected adverse human health effects.


