Keith Curtis Mussleman: Keith passed away on June 27, 2021, at age 89. Keith was born in Chico and had been a member of Branch 110 since November 1994.

Jim Kirks: As has been previously noted, Jim passed away on April 9, but his service was postponed until this summer. His service is now set for Saturday, August 28th, at 2 pm at the Faith Lutheran Church on E. First Avenue, across from Bidwell Perk.



July 9, 1971: U.S. National Security Adviser Henry Kissinger made a secret trip to the People's Republic of China after boarding a jet in Pakistan, part of his itinerary for an official worldwide "fact finding trip" and diplomatic visit to Asian nations. On its flight to Pakistan, Kissinger's plane turned north and flew to Beijing, where he met with Chinese Prime Minister Zhou Enlai for three days. While Kissinger was in China, the international press in Pakistan was told that Kissinger was "temporarily incapacitated by a stomach ailment" and staying in "a

mountain resort in the hills of northeast Pakistan" overnight. The visit was disclosed six days later by U.S. President Nixon.

July 15, 1971: U.S. President Nixon announced in a nationwide radio and television address that he had accepted an invitation to become the first U.S. President to visit the People's Republic of China, after being invited by China's Prime Minister Zhou Enlai. Nixon said that the visit would take place sometime before May 1972. The week-long visit, from February 21 to 28, 1972, allowed the American public to view images of China for the first time in over two decades.

Persistence and Determination II

Hiram was born in Ohio on April 27, 1822 to a well established family. His father became a successful Galena, Illinois tanner and merchant. Hiram had a good early education. Not wanting work in the leather business. He was admitted to West Point, and graduated 21 out of 39 in 1843. He served in the Mexican-American War from 1846-1848.

In 1848, he married Julia Dent, and together they had four children over the years.

Hiram's first post-war assignments took him and Julia to Detroit. When the discovery of gold in California brought droves of prospectors and settlers to the territory, Hiram and the 4th infantry were ordered to reinforce a small garrison and in August 1849, Hiram arrived in San Francisco. Julia did not follow him...

His next assignment sent him north to Vancouver in the Oregon Territory.

While he was posted up north, Hiram tried his hand at farming in order to supplement his salary. But the melting snow and rising waters destroyed all his crops and he lost all he had invested.

Then he tried shipping chickens down to San Francisco. However, they all perished on route.

After that, Hiram had another idea of shipping ice blocks to San Francisco where ice was fetching unheard of prices. But when the ship was delayed with strong headwinds, all the ice melted.

Right after the ice fiasco, Hiram partnered with another officer opening a billiard room and a social club. But their manager disappeared with all the money they had made.

On August 5, 1853, he was promoted to captain and assigned to command a Company of the 4th Infantry, at Fort Humboldt in California. On January 5, 1854, Hiram arrived at Fort Humboldt which was commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Robert C. Buchanan.

Separated from his wife and family, and frustrated by his financial losses, Hiram began to drink.

Colonel Buchanan reprimanded Hiram for one drinking episode and told him to "resign or reform." He was subsequently found drunk at his company's pay table. He resigned effective July 31, 1854.

Homesick and tired of his Western experiences, he returned to St. Louis and reunited with his family, with no means of support and very uncertain about his future.

In White Haven, Missouri, Hiram decided to become a farmer on sixty acres loaned by Julia's father. Hiram worked hard to change his bad luck and prove himself. However, he experienced no financial success at farming and had to start selling wood on the street corners of St. Louis, which was another blow to his pride.

In 1856, they moved to land on Julia's father's nearby farm, and built a home called "Hardscrabble". The family had little money, clothes, and furniture, but always had enough food.

In 1858, Hiram rented out Hardscrabble and moved his family to Julia's father's 850-acre plantation. That fall, after suffering from malaria, he finally admitted, after years of failure, that he would never succeed as a farmer, and he sold all his farm equipment, stock, and crops.

He was then walking the streets of St. Louis looking for a job, any job at that point.

In 1859, thanks again to his father-in-law's intervention and influence, Hiram found himself a partner in a law firm. He had no skills or qualifications to bring to this enforced partnership. He was so broke that he could not even rent a house in St. Louis. He ended up taking refuge in a bare room in a house, since he had no money to bring his family to the city. As no surprise, this partnership did not work and it was soon dissolved.

Hiram then traded the house in White Haven for a new house in St. Louis so his family could now join him. He made \$3,000 off the house but he soon lost it to a swindler in another business deal.

His gullibility in business matters seemed to know no end.

Hiram then got hired as a clerk in the custom-house but he was soon fired.

He was again back on the streets of St. Louis looking for a job to feed his family of six.

In April 1860, he made another attempt to make money in the civilian world but one that broke his heart more than any other attempts in the past. He had to return to Galena, Illinois, to work at his father's leather store. At age 38, he had to swallow his pride and work under his younger brothers.

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On April 12, 1861, the American Civil War began when Confederate troops attacked Fort Sumter. On April 15, Lincoln called for 75,000 volunteers. Hiram joined the Union Army. Ready to fight, Hiram recalled with satisfaction, "I never went into our leather store again."

Although his early efforts to be recommissioned were rejected, Hiram was finally appointed military aide to the Governor and recruited ten regiments into the Illinois militia. On June 14, Hiram was promoted to Colonel and put in charge of the 21st Illinois Volunteer Infantry Regiment. His regiment was transferred to Missouri to dislodge Confederate forces.

Hiram rose to prominence after winning several early Union victories on the Western Theater. In 1863 he led the Vicksburg campaign, and gained control of the Mississippi River. President Abraham Lincoln promoted him to Lieutenant General after his victory at Chattanooga. For thirteen months, he fought Robert E. Lee. On April 9, 1865, Lee surrendered to Hiram at Appomattox.

You have perhaps concluded that this story about Hiram was about Ulysses Grant, a man whose full name was Hiram Ulysses S. Grant, who ultimately became the eighteenth President of the United States.


